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Purpose

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1 Introduction

1.1 Purpose of the report

The fourth Public Consultation Event (PCE) for the Kilkee Flood Relief Scheme was held between Monday 26th February 2024 and Wednesday 06th March 2024. This report presents the details of the PCE itself and provides a summary of the feedback received.

This PCE was to give the public an opportunity to comment on the draft planning document set. The documents were put on public display throughout the period specified above and a public consultation day was held in the afternoon of the 6th March 2024 at Kilkee Library.

2 Promoting the Event

2.1 Overview

A variety of means of promoting / advertising were used to increase awareness of the day and aim to maximise attendance.

This event built upon connections made at the Early Engagement event, the Public Participation Day (August 2022), the Preferred Option Consultation Event (April 2023) and through site visits and contacts made over the course of the project.

2.2 Means of Promotion

Direct contact	Direct contact and word of mouth was useful as the community, and housing estates, are relatively small. This helped spread the message between people who had seen advertisements and those who had not. Those with a particular interest due to flooding incidents or landowners whose lands might be affected were contacted directly by CCC where possible.

Attendees reported hearing about the event from a range of sources, mainly advertising and word of mouth.



3 On the day

3.1 Project team representation

There were 5 representatives from the project team (Clare County Council, OPW and JBA Consulting).

3.2 Supporting Material

The following materials were available on the day:

- Sign-in sheet and GDPR consent statement.
- Series of posters (wall-mounted and laid out on tables) which covered the following topics:
 - Planning layouts for the Atlantic Stream, covering the Kilkee Bay Hotel,
 Sandpark / Dún an Óir estate, and Waterworld / Atlantic outfall culvert. Cross-section drawings were presented beneath the plan layouts.
 - Planning layouts for the Well Stream, Crescent Place / Victoria Court, and Western Tributary / Victoria streams. Cross-section drawings were presented beneath / beside the plan layouts.
 - Photomontages of the intended scheme for selected areas of the Victoria and Atlantic Stream
 - AA Screening & NIS Reports (A4, one copy)
 - Environmental Impact Assessment Report (A4, one copy)
 - Hydrology & Hydraulics Report (A4, one copy)
 - Options Report (A4, one copy)

3.3 Attendance

Nineteen (19) attendees were recorded on the sign-in sheet. It was noted that some attendees did not sign in, with an estimated attendance of twenty-three (23). This includes those who signed the register when they visited the library to view the documents in the period leading up to the consultation evening.

Questionnaires were not requested as part of the event. However, several emails were received both before and after the event.



4 Feedback received

4.1 Summary of notes from discussions and queries raised on the day.

- A number of queries relating to potential ponds on the Atlantic Stream were raised.
- Planning and construction timelines were queried by a number of people with concerns around access being dominant.
- One resident queried whether the bridge that currently exists over the Well Stream will be maintained.
- One resident queried whether coastal risk was being assessed as part of the scheme.
- Queries around interaction of the scheme with the Uisce Eireann pump station were raised.
- A query was raised in relation to a number of properties in the Atlantic Stream which were indicated to flood in the baseline but were not indicated as being protected.

5 Summary of PCE

5.1 Practical Arrangements

The venue size was appropriate and the facilities available were suitable. This venue would therefore be preferred for all future Public Participation Days.

The event was widely advertised. No feedback was received in relation to late or poor advertising of the event.

5.2 Lessons Learnt

- Meeting with the local councillors a week prior to the event was useful. This
 allowed the design team to get initial feedback on what was to be presented. It
 also performed as a means of advertising the event, as the councillors spread
 notice of the event by word of mouth and by their own social media channels.
- A number of attendees asked whether a presentation would be given. This wasn't advertised to be given, but it possibly needs to be clearly stated.
- Good attendance
- The photomontages were useful in clearly presenting before and after scenarios.
- An overall map of Kilkee just indicating properties may have been useful as the drawings provided were focussed on the areas of the scheme and didn't provide a whole scheme overview.
- There was very little attendance in the final hour of the event. This may relate to the second bullet point above where it was possible people assumed a presentation would occur at the beginning of the session.



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
